

What is the Winona County CARE Program?

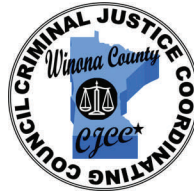
The Minnesota Department of Public Safety-Office of Justice Programs has awarded Winona County a \$386,210 grant for the Community Assessment and Reintegration (CARE) Program developed by the Criminal Justice Coordinating Council. The CARE Program is an inmate re-entry program designed to prevent recidivism which utilizes best practices in the re-entry field including comprehensive case management, coordinated service delivery and mentoring.

What are the benefits of a reentry program?

- **For the Community**
 - Greater accountability for the offender
 - Positive approach to offender adjudication
 - Less victimization/greater public safety
 - Reduced incarceration costs
 - Greater offender supervision
 - Limiting the “warehousing” mentality regarding offenders
 - Enabling offenders to become productive members of the community
- **For the Offender**
 - Break in the criminal cycle
 - Improve interpersonal skills
 - Learn and practice financial responsibility
 - Opportunity for intervention
 - Focus towards positive outcomes
 - Improve family relationships

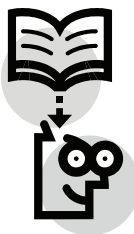

Who is eligible for the CARE Program?

To be eligible for the program, an offender must meet all of the following criteria:

- Be a Winona County resident
- Be convicted as an adult in criminal court
- Be incarcerated in Winona County or a state prison for at least 15 days (and, if a state prisoner, is within 30 days of release)
- Reside in Winona County for at least 90 days post-release
- Voluntarily participate in the program
- Be identified as having a risk of re-offending
- Not be a level 3 sex offender
- Not have been enrolled in the CARE Program within the last 90 days

An offender who does not precisely meet the above criteria may gain admission into the program through a professional override process.

Why are re-entry programs important?

- ◆ There are many reasons why people resort to unlawful behaviors. CARE is equipped to assess those reasons in order to significantly reduce the number of repeat occurrences.
- ◆ Almost all offenders return back to the communities in which they previously lived. Returning without addressing the issues that caused them to offend will likely cause the ex-offender to become a re-offender.
- ◆ Many offenders struggle with a great number of issues such as addictions, mental and physical disabilities, lack of family support, inadequate education, unemployment and lack of housing. The CARE Program can help to address these issues.
- ◆ Without programs aimed at reducing the likelihood of ex-offenders becoming re-offenders, tax dollars for incarceration increase as the rates of repeat offenders also increases.
- ◆ Without intervention, the types and number of the crimes committed by re-offenders may continue to increase in number and severity.
